More than **8,000** men, women and children in Pennsylvania await life-saving organ transplants.

95% of us say we support organ donation, but in Pennsylvania, only 46% are actually registered as organ and tissue donors.




18 HRS Someone in PA dies every 18 hours waiting for a life-saving organ that never comes.

More than half of the national transplant waiting list is made up of multicultural populations. Although it is possible for a

candidate to match a donor from another racial or ethnic group, transplant success rates increase when organs are matched between members of the same ethnic background.

HOW DOES THE PROCESS WORK?

1. WAITING FOR A TRANSPLANT



When someone's organ is failing, he or she is placed on the national organ transplant waiting list. The list is very long, and not everyone survives while waiting for an organ.

2. MATCH FOUND

3. LIFE SAVED

Once a match is found, the patient is contacted by his or her transplant team.
