Did You Know ?

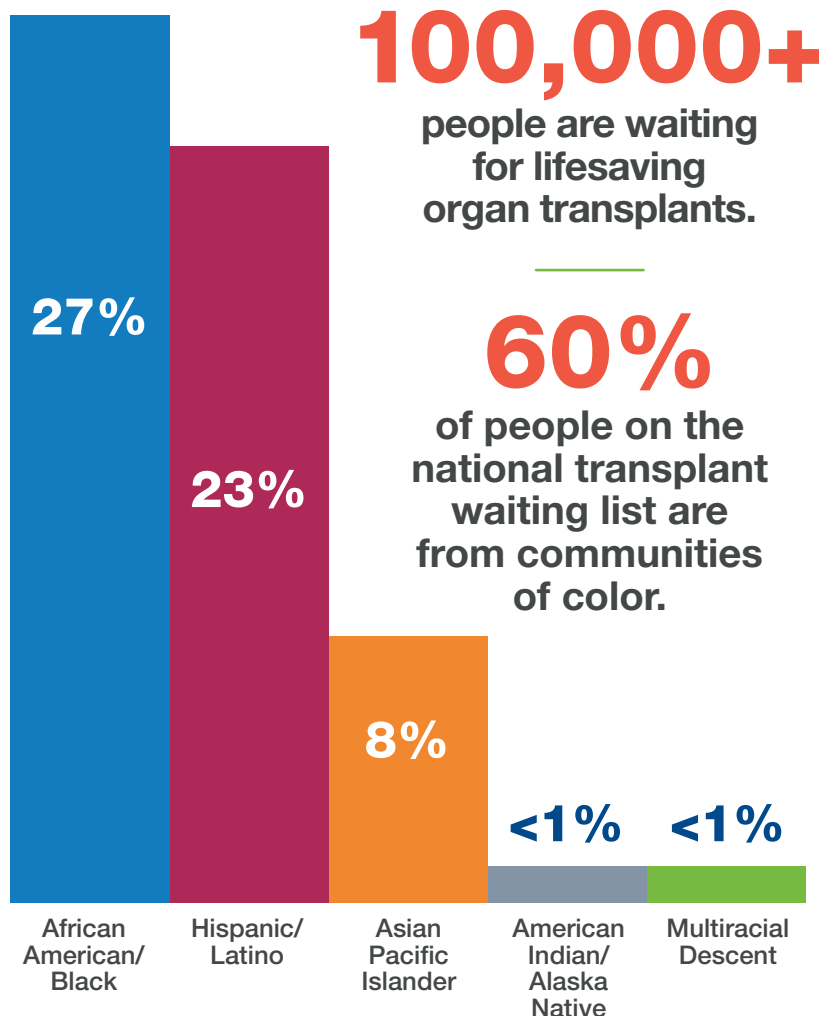
Transplants can be successful regardless of the ethnicity of the donor and recipient. However, the chance of longer-term survival may be greater if the donor and recipient are closely matched in terms of their shared genetic background.

Prior to January 2023, Black patients were treated unfairly because of a race-based kidney function test. **A new policy is now in place** that requires hospitals to check their kidney transplant waiting lists and adjust the wait times of black patients who were previously affected by an unfair system.

This change is a crucial step toward **addressing disparities** in organ transplantation and **ensuring equitable access** to lifesaving care for all.

By December 2024, more than **14,000 Black kidney transplant candidates had their wait times adjusted** thanks to the update to the race-neutral eGFR policy.

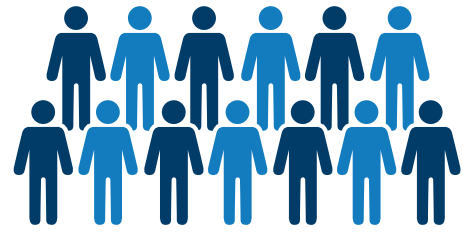

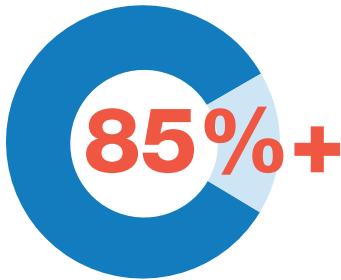

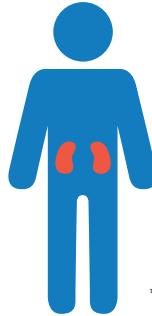

Top Frequently Asked Questions

Does registering as a donor change my patient care?

No, your life always comes first. Doctor's work hard to save every patient's life. Donation does not become a possibility until all lifesaving efforts have been exhausted.

Does donation affect funeral plans?

Funeral arrangements of your choice are possible, including a viewing. Through the entire donation process the body is treated with care and respect. Following donation, funeral arrangements can continue as planned.

Does my religion support organ, eye and tissue donation?

All major religions support donation as a final act of compassion and generosity.

Does my social and/or financial status play any part in whether or not I will receive an organ if I ever need one?

No. A national system matches available organs from the donor with people on the waiting list based on blood type, body size, how sick they are, donor distance, tissue type and time on the list. Race, gender, income, celebrity and social status, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression does NOT prevent someone from registering as an organ donor.
